HPD Recognizes Officers with Commendations

As most residents will know by now, the Village of Hodgkins is watched over by quite a professional and dedicated array of police officers who've grown to love the village they serve. On occasion, the demands of their service result in marked acts of diligence and valor. And it is at such times that Police Chief Ernest Millsap feels particularly compelled to recognize these officers for their outstanding service and dedication.

At the regular monthly Village Board meeting on January 14th, 2019, Chief Millsap awarded six police officers with commendations for their recent actions in service to the community. Each of the officers was called forward to be presented with the award by the chief, and photographed with himself and Mayor Cummings.

Sergeant Michael Bennett, along with Officers Matthew Hosteny, Joseph Klotz, and Desmond Handson, were awarded officer commendations for their actions in response to a residential structure fire in the Valley Oaks Mobile Home Park. On the date of this fire (March 26th, 2018), these officers were in the vicinity and arrived on scene ahead of the Fire Department. They quickly moved to ensure the occupants were evacuated from the structure. They then proceeded to warn the residents in the two mobile homes to the immediate north of the blaze, to get those homes cleared as well, due to the risk of the flames spreading, relocating those residents to a safe area. well away from the fire.

Officer Frank White was awarded a commendation for his actions in response to a situation in which two small children were left unattended in a vehicle in the parking lot of the Quarry Shopping Center in early December 2018. When Officer White discovered the children, he remained on scene with them until the father returned, at which point the father was taken into custody for child endangerment. Officer White, along with Officer Kelly Beyer, followed up an investigation with in which it was determined the father had left the two-yearolds unattended in the cold for a total of fourteen minutes, and was also in possession of an illegal weapon.

Sergeant Jeff Keilman was awarded a commendation for his actions in response to a drug overdose. On June 1st, 2018, he responded to a call in which a victim was found unconscious and unresponsive. Suspecting an opiate overdose, Sergeant Keilman administered Narcan to the victim and was able to revive

him. His valiant actions resulted in a life-saving outcome for this individual.

Chief Millsap's sentiments for the outstanding work of the officers could perhaps be best summed up in these words from his commendation to them: "Your professionalism and dedication reflects highly on the Hodgkins Police Department and the Village of Hodgkins."

Garbage pick up Reminder:

Garbage pick up is on Wednesdays for the Village customers that have Groot. All trash should be ready for pick up anytime after 7am. On major holidays the trash will be picked up the Thursday after (instead of the Wednesday).

Pick Up of Larger Items

Larger items can be picked up by our Public Works Dept. This service is available for residents. If you need something picked up please call the Village Hall. Pick ups are generally done in the mornings. The item or items must be left in the driveway or end of lot. The Public Works Dept. cannot go on your porch or in your homes due to liability. We cannot pick up hazardous material, paint, tires, batteries, etc.

Trucks may also be dropped off for larger projects for the day and even over night. These are a first come first serve basis as a service to our residents.

Spring clean Up: branches should be stacked with cut side towards the curb. Grass clippings can only be picked up in biodegradable paper bags no plastic bags. The bags can not exceed 40lbs.

IN MEMORIAM

Retired Hodgkins Police Officer Stanley E. Warwick passed away on February 18th, 2019. He was 81 years old.

On February 4th, 1979 Officer Stan Warwick began his career with the Hodgkins Police Department. Stan was already a police officer with the Indian Head Park Police Department for about 5 years. Although he was hired as a part time police officer, in those days he worked full time hours. He was hired full time in 1984. Stan retired in 1995 and they moved to Sevierville Tennessee.

Stan was born and raised in Chicago, in the Bridgeport neighborhood. After high school he worked for Acme Steel Company as a machinist.

In 1953, Stan enlisted in the United States Army. He served over 5 years including

2 years in West Germany with the 2nd Armored Division.

A friend introduced him to Mary in 1961 and as the saying goes, the rest is history. They married in 1962. Stan and Mary would eventually move to Sauk Village and raise three children, Kurt, Douglas and Dana. When the opportunity to buy a house in Hodgkins came up, they didn't hesitate. Stan was the manager of



the "66 Drive-In" which ' was located on the 🔎 property now occupied by the Countryside Plaza. It was there that he became friends with a Countryside Police Officer who convinced him to get into law enforcement and Stan jumped at the chance with the Indian Head Park Police Department after the Drive-In closed down. When he became a Full-Time police officer with Hodgkins in 1984 he was 47 years old and attended the Cook County Sheriffs Police Training Academy.

Stan was instrumental in setting up the Code ARMORE Enforcement office and served as our first

Enforcement office and served as our first code enforcement police officer. He was also a Charter Member of the Hodgkins Fraternal Order of Police Lodge #151 and a Past President. He was a proud member of the Blue Knights Law Enforcement Motorcycle Club Illinois Chapter

> IX and the K-Town Good Sam Chapter 21 Motor Home Club.

Stan and Mary had a few motorcycles over the years and enjoyed taking trips. After retirement and the move to Tennessee they progressed from motorcycles to motor homes.

Smart911 Comes to Hodgkins

In the ongoing march of technology, new public safety tools are continually arriving to increase our options for protecting our communities. One very important tool that has recently come to town is the Smart911 service. a telecommunications software system that enables dispatchers to bring up a wide array of valuable information about a caller and their home, business, or vehicle, and about family members or other emergency contacts. It can also enable public safety personnel to locate mobile phone users with pinpoint precision in the event the caller is unable to move or respond to rescuers looking for them.

The Village of Hodgkins is served by the Oak Lawn Regional Emergency Communications (OLREC) center, which handles all our 911 emergency calls. Diana Tousignant, the director at OLREC, has announced that Smart911 has been added to their set of telecommunications tools and was launched as a fully functioning service at the beginning of this year. She is encouraging everyone to go online at www.smart911.com and sign up.

"Smart911 is a free service that allows individuals and families to sign up online to receive emergency alerts involving their area," Tousignant said in a recent comment to the Des Plaines Valley News. "The system also allows users to provide key information to 911 call takers during an emergency that will help first responders reach them faster."

Through enrollment in Smart911, a user can provide only as much information as they choose to provide, with some of the options including medical conditions, vulnerable family members, and even info about pets. The data provided can help shave valuable seconds or even minutes off response times when it comes to getting first responders to the right place and equipped with the most pertinent information.

In her comments, the director touted the ease and user-friendliness of the new



program.

"Users will receive emails reminding them to update their profiles every six months," she said. "Anyone who wants to complete a safety profile for a family member who does not use computers can do so, and include their own contact information as well so they will be notified if anything happens."

With this rollout by OLREC, Hodgkins, Burbank, Bridgeview, Alsip, and Evergreen Park will now join the ranks of the few other early users of the service in Illinois, such as the 911 centers for DuPage County, Cook County, and Chicago. Smart911 is currently available in 40 states across the country.
