🏂 TAX REBATE & GARBAGE REBATE 💲

It's not too late for the Residential Tax Rebates. The Rebates are paid to those residents who receive property tax bills from Cook County. The Tax bill must have homeowners exemption. Proof of payment is required. This is obtained by a receipt from your bank or lender. The Village will reimburse you the Village of Hodgkins portion listed on your tax bill plus 10%. If you have not filed for your Property Tax Rebate yet, please contact the Village Hall for information.

Mobile Home residents and those residents that rent or lease an apartment are eligible for a rebate as long as you have resided in Hodgkins as of January 1st, 2018 and still reside here. These rebates will be available starting November 14th, 2018

Mandatory Home Inspections Prior To Resale

FOR ALL RESIDENTIAL BUILDINGS AND MOBILE HOME STRUCTURES

Inspections prior to resale shall only be required when selling a residential building or a mobile home with a structure 15 years or older at the time of sale.

This is a MANDATORY INSPECTION for all residential buildings or mobile home structures. It is the responsibility of the owner, (Seller) of the property to notify the Village of the impending sale. In the case of a mobile home the seller is required by our ordinance to make their park manager aware of the sale. The mobile home park manager is required to make the Village aware of the sale.

Alida Millsap: A Hodgkins Resident You Should Know

A community's cultural wealth can often be measured by its memories, and one of the greatest reservoirs of living Hodgkins memory can be found in Mrs. Alida (Latham) Millsap. The mother of four generations of Hodgkins residents, she is one of the oldest long time residents of the village of Hodgkins.

Alida is the fourth child, out of eight, of Victor and Ruth Latham, who moved to Chicago from Wisconsin in 1929. Her father worked in Chicago at Natural Cylinder Gas, which later

moved operations to Hodgkins, in December 1934. After the company moved, they lived initially in the unincorpo-

rated South LaGrange (now Countryside), where Alida was born in 1935, and moved into Hodgkins in June 1936. Her father later became a Hodgkins Trustee, in 1939, and her mother served as Treasurer from 1964-1969. Alida's earliest memories are in Hodgkins.

She grew up in a close family in a tight-knit community during the Great Depression and, later, during World War II. In Hodgkins, she says, "if you needed help, all you had to do was yell 'help!' out the door and someone would come running to help you. You knew everybody, so you knew you could trust them." She remembers having the same doctor, Dr. Ingals, as Dee Dee Buralli (Kovel), Norma Stefanini, and Eunice Dolgner. She attended Hodgkins School, which only had two rooms at the time, with only about forty kids, total. There were, at most, twenty students to a classroom. Some of her fond memories are of the "Firemans'



Dance," which was a benefit dance held each October at the Fire Hall on Kane Avenue, Christmas parties at school, and a Christmas play performed at the church. At that play, every child would be given a gift bag.

"For a lot of us, that was just about what we got for Christmas, until things started getting a little better during and right after the war," she relates.

Alida's family was the third family in town to get a television, a 10-inch General Electric model. It only carried four channels. Children often played at the playground behind the school, or played baseball in the streets. "Boys would go down to the river, too, but we girls didn't. Our parents would warn us about the hobos, how the hobos would get us, so we didn't go. I never crossed the tracks," she added. She fondly recalls the Easter Egg Hunts, and the Trick or Treat nights when the boys would knock over the alley-side outdoor toilets at houses that wouldn't give them treats.

There were only three streets in town in those days, she says, and those were Kimball, Kane, and Conrad, with Cobb connecting only to Conrad until 1949, the year she began driving. There was no police department, only a police magistrate.

"People rarely called for police, since the majority of residents were related anyway, so most people just settled their own differences. And there were no secrets in Hodgkins; everyone knew everybody else's business," she added, laughing. "If you made a phone call, you had to be careful what you said, since it was an eight-party line."

"In those days, welfare was called 'relief,' and people who had to go on relief were so embarrassed, that they got off as fast as they could. Relatives helped them through it. They never really got money, but food, and clothes from a secondhand store."

In 1949, she, Dee Dee Buralli, Shirley Bluder, Fred Klotz, and Donnie Budzik were the last class to graduate

eighth grade from Hodgkins School when it still only had two rooms, as that was the year they added two more rooms to the school. In 1953, the 7th and 8th grades were moved to Ideal School, which was located where ODM is currently situated. Students mostly walked there. She remembers that in those days the "top of the hill" had Croatian Catholic residents, whereas the "bottom of the hill" had the German Lutheran residents, and they didn't as a rule mix socially.

After the war, Reynold's, Electromotive, Fisher Body, and other factories came to the area, and there was plenty of work for everyone, so much so that many people came up from the South to work near Hodgkins. Alida quit school at age seventeen and went to work at Electromotive. At that time, a good conduct record at school was all that was needed to get a good job. She worked there from June 1952 until May 1953.

It was during this time that she met her soon-to-be husband, Vernon Millsap. He was up from Cleveland, Tennessee, working for Reynold's. She met him while sitting on a large rock on Kane Avenue, on a Monday, his day off work, in late June of 1952. By the following April, in 1953, they were married. They married in Chatsworth, Georgia, because of age restrictions in other places they tried.

"I was eighteen, and he was nineteen. In Illinois, he needed to be twenty-one, and I only had to be eighteen. In Cleveland, Tennessee, I had to be twenty-one, and he only needed to be eighteen, so it was exactly reversed! So we went to Chatsworth, Georgia, since there you only had to be twelve to get legally married!" she laughed.



After the wedding, they returned to Hodgkins and lived in a number of locations in town before settling at the location of her current home on Chester, where they moved in 1958. Their children started arriving in 1953, starting with Vernon, then Larry, David, Lida, Marge, RV, and Ernest. "If you asked me what happened here in Hodgkins between 1953 and 1962, I couldn't tell you," she said. "I had seven babies."

She and Vernon made many trips back down south to see his family, but this was difficult with so many children, traveling in a station wagon with no air conditioner. In later years, once the kids started driving, Alida opted to sit out

many of these journeys. Vern later talked her into getting a second house in southern Illinois, where he enjoyed getting away for hunting and other outdoor activities. But Hodgkins had become his true home, and he was always glad to get back to it. He served from 1975-1977, and again from 1981-1985, as a Hodgkins Trustee.

Vernon passed away in March 2017, after sixty-four years of marriage to Alida. He had been preceded in death by their son, Larry, and by their daughter-in-law, Lisa. Today, Alida has six living children, sixteen grandchildren, and eight great-grandchildren. Her great-grandson, Landon Smith, is the fourth generation in her family to attend Hodgkins School. Alida also takes pride in her family's civic heritage. Her father, Victor Latham, her husband, Vernon Millsap, her son, Ernest Millsap, and now her daughter, Lida Mills, have all served as Trustees for the Village of Hodgkins. In addition, her brother-in-law, Lee Gallman, served as Hodgkins' first police chief, until 1959. Mrs. Millsap considers Hodgkins her only home in the world. When discussing this community, she said poignantly, "I wouldn't live any other place."

Mayor Cummings Visits "TARP" Tunnel and Reservoir Plan







Many residents of Hodgkins may not be aware of the "Deep Tunnel" system, a network of deep, large-diameter tunnels and reservoirs designed to regulate sanitation and prevent flooding throughout the greater Chicago area, run by the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District (MWRD) of Greater Chicago. On Thursday, September 20th, Mayor Cummings, joined by Hodgkins Trustees Larry Rice and Lida Millsap, Police Chief Ernest Millsap, and Hodgkins employees Rodney Cummings and Jodi Ellsworth, took a tour of the remarkable Mainstream Pumping Station on River Road in Hodgkins.

Officially named TARP (the Tunnel and Reservoir Plan), this system has been in effect since 2006, when Phase 1 (the tunnels) was completed. Phase 2 (the reservoirs) is projected to be fully complete by 2029. This system has 109 miles of tunnels running across the Chicago area, to as far away as Wilmette,

with a 2.3 billion gallon capacity for the tunnels and a 20.55 billion gallon capacity for the whole system, including reservoirs. It covers a 352 square mile service area, and serves 3.75 million people. It is estimated to provide savings of over \$180 million in annual flood damage, and to protect 1.5 million structures from flooding. In addition to these benefits, it has helped to managed pollution to local rivers, dramatically increasing the number of fish species that now live in Chicago area waterways. In 1978, there were seven aquatic species in the Chica-



go Area Water System; in 2012, after just six years of operation, there were 79 species. Fish life also helps to clean the water, further accelerating the rehabilitation of the local waterways.

During the tour, Chief Operating Engineer Thomas Ryan took the mayor and his group 297 feet below the ground, equivalent to the

height of a thirty-story building, to one of two large pumping rooms at the Mainstream Pumping Station in Hodgkins, although the tunnel itself goes much lower. Constructed with earthquake survivability in mind, and conscious of the risks of contamination and groundwater infiltration, the tunnels are sealed with grout and lined with concrete. The enormous pumping room houses six huge pumps, which force 330 cubic feet of water per second across a differential head, or height displacement, of over 350 feet throughout the system. The air in the entire pumping room, hundreds of feet long and at least four stories high, is exchanged

Carrasquillo and Kringlie Become Range Instructors

After many years serving Hodgkins Police Department in the position of Range Master, Ofc. Jim Pierce decided to pass the duties along to successors. After a careful application and selection process, Chief Millsap selected of two officers to head up the range: Sergeant Ryan Carrasquillo and Officer Phillip Kringlie. The two officers were then sent to the Police Training Institute's four-week Master

Firearms Instructor Course in Champaign, Illinois.



Sgt. Carrasquillo has been with Hodgkins PD since 2007. Over the years, he has served as a motorcycle officer and performed many special duties. He was promoted to the rank of Sergeant in 2017. He graduated Staff and Command School in May of 2018, and completed his Master Firearms Instructor Certification and Riffle Instructor Certification in August 2018. The certification program is an in-depth training program covering all the latest and most up-to-date practices in firearms handling. It consists of three stages: Police Strategy and Tactics, Tactical Firearms, and Instructor Development. They take new instructors and provide them the training to teach, and to design and later run a range program that's current with modern training,

meeting today's real world training needs. Sgt. Carrasquillo is excited to fully inhabit his new role.

"As a new sergeant, and now sergeant in charge of the range, my goal is to make sure our officers are the best-trained and equipped officers to meet any challenges and demands they encounter



in the field. I'm thankful to the Village of Hodgkins for sending us to this training, which properly prepares us to put together and run a range program that will be second to none."

Ofc. Kringlie started at Hodgkins PD in June 2008. He was selected by the department for the 5th District SWAT (Special Weapons and Tactics) Team, and graduated the week-long FBI SWAT School in May 2012, where he learned basic SWAT tactics taught by senior FBI SWAT instructors in North Chicago at the FBI Training Academy. When he completed this training, he joined Ofc. Jeff Piotrowski, who's been serving on the SWAT team for many years, as the second

Hodgkins SWAT officer.

In December 2012, Ofc. Kringlie also attended a SWAT team class, offered at New Mexico Tech, for Prevention of and Response to Suicide Bombing Incidents. While serving on the SWAT team, Ofc. Kringlie has been assigned as Breacher, an operator who analyzes a structure and determines the quickest and safest way to breach the perimeter and get the team inside.

In 2013, Ofc. Kringlie attended and graduated a week-long TEES (Tactical Energetic Entry Systems) course, a mechanical, thermal, and ballistic breaching course, where he learned various breaching techniques using rams, shotguns, saws, and torches. Most recently, in June 2018, he attended and graduated a week-long Tactical Explosive Breacher (TEBC) Course, certified through Forced Entry Tactical. He's quick to point out the wide applicability of his new range instructor training.
