
A Message from Mayor Noel B. Cummings . . .

At 95 years old I have been blessed with longevity but more importantly I have been blessed with the Village of Hodgkins. In 1979 I had no idea I would still be Mayor 43 years later. In fact, I would not have recognized our little Village today. I have had the good



fortune to have wonderful trustees and staff to partner

with in the development of Hodgkins. Our commercial and

industrial base multiplied many times over. Our retail sales tax has gone from \$30,000 to \$10,000,000 annually. In fact, a recent revenue report indicates that we have the most sales tax per resident in Illinois. Our Estimated Appraised Valuation went from \$12 million to \$300 million.

But it is you the residents that I have to thank for my decades as your Mayor. It has been 10 elections you have given your trust in my ability to lead Hodgkins. It is that vote of confidence that will give me my most satisfaction as Mayor of Hodgkins.

I also want to assure you that I am leaving the Village in good hands. Ernest Millsap, a life long resident and former Hodgkins Police Chief will be taking over as Acting President. Ernest has also served as Village Trustee for eighteen years. He is as well prepared to lead as you could possibly ask for.

VACANT LOTS SALE

The Village of Hodgkins presently owns two (2) residential lots (Zoned R-1) which will be offered for sale pursuant to our bid process. The addresses of these properties are:

Successful bidder must commence construction within twelve months of the acceptance of said bid. The bids will be opened at 10:00 am on November 7, 2022.

Five thousand (\$5,000) dollar non-refundable earnest money required of successful bidder, with up to six (6) months to remit balance of purchase price.

The Village of Hodgkins is now enforcing Ordinance No. 22-01

The following procedures shall be followed from November 1st through April when snowfall of 2" or more shall occur:

On odd numbered days there shall be parking only on sides of the street with odd numbers. *Example* - If 2" or more snowfall occurs on January 1st, all vehicles must be parked on the sides of street with odd numbers or in the owner's driveway.

On even numbered days there shall be parking only on sides of the street with even numbers. *Example* - If 2" or more snowfall occurs on January 2nd, all vehicles must be parked on the sides of street with even numbers or in the owner's driveway.

Residents parking on Cobb and Lyons Streets: on even numbered days there shall be parking only on the south side of the street. On odd numbered days there shall be parking only on the north side of the street.

Lieutenant Cimino Jumps into Aging Well

In the past six months, a new regular face has appeared at the monthly Hodgkins-McCook Aging Well meetings, held in the Larry Rice Room in the lower level of the village hall. Mike Cimino, Lieutenant of Patrol at the Hodgkins Police Department, has become an honorary member of the group, speaking frequently to the elders on a variety of topics such as personal safety, technology security, and frauds and scams to avoid. He also works to pre-emptively curtail elder abuse and financial exploitation of the elderly. Friendly and affable, Lt. Cimino is quite approachable and ready to provide assistance to all who need it.



A twenty-five-year veteran of the department, Lt. Cimino came to Hodgkins in the 1990s from Justice, along with two other officers. He has served in a variety of roles in the department, in both patrol and in the Juvenile Division. For thirteen years, Mike was the Hodgkins D.A.R.E. Officer, and he currently heads the Juvenile Division for the department, with a strong emphasis on community policing. He brings all of this experience to his talks with the Aging Well group.

Lt. Cimino is now administering the Freedom Alerts program, with the ready assistance of Lt. Jeff Keilman. Freedom Alerts are personal pendants which house a button elders can press to alert first responders that they need help. He also oversees the Knox Box program, which makes sturdy steel boxes available to people who need to place a key on the front of their houses for first responders to enter their homes in case of emergencies. If you have any questions about either of these programs, Lt. Cimino is the one to talk with.

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CHIEF MILLSAP ENDS LONG LAW ENFORCEMENT CAREER

A fixture of Hodgkins has ended a long and storied law enforcement career. Ernest Millsap, former Village Trustee and lifelong civic supporter, completed 38 years in law enforcement in August. He served ten of those years as the Chief of Police in Hodgkins. In an emotional reading at the regular Village Board meeting on Monday, August 8th, he announced his intention to retire effective August 19th. Friends, family, co-workers, and members of the community congratulated him in a party held by his family afterwards.



Ernest grew up in a large family, the youngest of seven children, a lifelong Hodgkins resident. Because he always enjoyed helping people and solving problems, he grew up with an interest in civics. His father, Vernon, who served as a Village Trustee, encouraged him in this. Initially studying accounting at Moraine Valley Community College, he soon lost interest in that profession in favor of law enforcement. When an opportunity to test with the Hodgkins Police Department came available, he did so, and was hired in 1984 along with Hansel Howard, Janet Klotz, Jim Kubic, Stan Warwick, and Joe Moxley. He was sworn in by Dolores Hardesty, with Mayor Cummings looking on. Rich Stewart was Chief of Police then, and Ernest recounted that he learned a lot under the direction of Chief Stewart, who would often share morning coffee with the guys.

Due to temporary downsizing in 1987, Ernest was laid off from the Hodgkins Police Department and hired onto the Countryside Police Department the same year, from the top position on their list. During his years in Countryside, he worked special assignments in Crime Prevention, Traffic Car, Code Enforcement, Juvenile Officer, and DARE Officer. "The thing I enjoyed most was being the DARE Officer for twelve years and helping to guide and steer young people in a good direction," he said.

In the years leading up to 2006, while leading DARE, he organized a charity Walk-A-Thon and basketball game every year as a fundraiser. Among the causes he's proud to have supported were St. Jude Children's Research Hospital and a fund for injured officers raised through a special DARE program. He feels that his crowning achievement from this period was purchasing a special mechanical assist chair for a little girl named Lupita who was paralyzed from the neck down. This was a fundraiser that he and his wife, Joan, worked on together, raising forty thousand dollars for her family.

Through the years, his family was supportive of his career as a police officer.

"I feel like I have my own family to thank for instilling in me good family values," he said. "And although my law enforcement career always made my mom nervous, and later my wife (especially at night), there were some funny times, too. I always picked up doughnuts at the end of a night shift to take home in the morning to my family, and my daughter Tiffany would tell her Tot Time teacher that her daddy made doughnuts for a living."

While recounting the exploits from his law enforcement career, he shared a harrowing but funny story. Sometime in the early 2000s, he was just starting his midnight shift and heard tires squealing in the distance. He turned to look just as a car was jumping the curb from 55th Street into the PD parking lot. The car struck his own personal vehicle, backed away, then came straight at him as he was sitting in his squad car. At the last possible second, the driver turned and struck the empty squad car next to him head-on, and got stuck on it. As Ernest exited his squad car, the man got out and fled on foot, with Ernest in hot pursuit. The suspect ran into the dispatch center shouting that a man was chasing him. The offender was quickly determined to be drunk, and was subsequently arrested for DUI, among other charges.

Ernest served a total of twenty-five years at Countryside, and fourteen years at Hodgkins PD in a steadfast and dedicated career. In summarizing his time as Chief in Hodgkins, he had this to say:

"I still believe the law enforcement profession is one of the most honorable jobs in our country. I've been

honored and humbled to serve alongside the men and women of the Hodgkins Police Department. Hodgkins has a dedicated group of sworn officers and civilian employees committed to safeguarding the lives and

property of the Hodgkins community. Their passion for providing world class community policing to the citizens that live, work, and visit our village has made Hodgkins one of the safest communities in Illinois."

"Hodgkins is a unique town with a lot of great people living here. I want to thank the Mayor and Village Board for the past ten years. You have helped make my job a little easier. Doing the right thing for the benefit of our village and helping people in need has been my goal from day one. The residents of the Village of Hodgkins should be thankful for having such a great team of board members, public works, and front office employees. Hodgkins is in my heart and there's no place in the world I would rather live and raise a family."

OFFICER JIM PIERCE ENDS TOUR OF DUTY

After twenty-five years working for the Hodgkins Police Department, and twenty-nine serving in law enforcement, Officer Jim Pierce has hung up his police officer hat in a well-deserved retirement.

With friends, co-workers, and family gathered around, Officer Pierce was given a cake and coffee send-off on Friday, June 3rd, his last official day. Those gathered listened as the radio dispatcher read out the response to his final 10-42:

> From the men and women of the Hodgkins Police Department: Thank you Officer James Pierce for your 29 years of dedicated service to law enforcement. Your role as a master firearms instructor has been an especially important part of our operations. We all will miss you. Best wishes to you and your family as you begin a well-earned retirement and enter the next chapter of your life.

Jim grew up in Worth, Illinois. He graduated from Stagg High School in Palos Hills. As soon as he could, he enlisted in the United States Marine Corps, and began his basic training at the age of 18, in 1985. He served for a year and a half on barracks duty in Sicily, in The Fleet in California as a Rifleman, and did six months of jungle training in Asia and Australia while deployed with WESTPAC (a unit deployment program for the Western Pacific). He completed his service with the Marines in 1989.

After leaving the military, Jim became an iron worker in downtown Chicago, until 1993. He started testing for police officer lists in 1992. He was soon hired by the Justice Police Department, in April 1993. He worked there until June 1997, when he was hired by the Hodgkins Police Department.

"Hodgkins had great pay, good management, a solid tax base where local businesses were concerned everything you look for when it comes to opportunity and stability," Jim said of his move.

In 2005, Jim's long interest in shooting and range instruction got him invited by then-Chief Kringlie to serve as the department's primary Range Instructor. Certified as a Master Firearms Instructor, he served in that role for thirteen years, until 2018. Over the years, Jim also served in the capacity of Field Training Officer and held some off-duty security jobs.

When asked if he had any parting thoughts on his time in Hodgkins, Officer Pierce had this to say: "I want to thank the people of Hodgkins for how well you took care of me and my family and helped me make a great career. I owe so much to this great community."

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PROMOTIONS AT HODGKINS POLICE DEPARTMENT

With the retirement of Chief Millsap, the Hodgkins Police Department has experienced a significant shift in personnel roles. At a special meeting of the Village Board on August 25th, Deputy Chief Joseph Klotz was

appointed the new Chief of Police. SGT Ryan Carrasquillo was appointed to the position of Patrol Lieutenant back on July 11th at the regular Village Board meeting, and LT Mike Cimino has now stepped into the new role of Administrative Lieutenant. The three of them, along with the Investigations Lieutenant, Jeff Keilman, will now lead the department in its mission of honorably protecting life and property, and serving all members of our community with professionalism and dedication.

Chief Joseph Klotz is a lifelong resident of Hodgkins. Educated first at Lyons Township High School, he worked for some of those years as a reporter with the Des Plaines Valley News under John Noonan. He earned a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Music at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky. He went on to study at the University of Kentucky in Lexington, where he earned a Master of Arts Degree in Music Theory and Composition. He taught school after returning

to Illinois, before being hired as a Records Clerk with the Hodgkins Police Department. When an eligibility list for Patrol Officer was started, he applied, and had soon earned a position at the top of that list. He was hired as a Patrol Officer in 2008.

Over the years, Chief Klotz worked a number of assignments in Patrol. He is a Field Training Officer and an Evidence Technician for the department. He also served as a Traffic Crash Investigator on SMART (the



Suburban Major Accident Reconstruction Team). In December 2020, he was appointed by the Village Board to the position of Deputy Chief. With a sharp mind and a strong sense of duty, he has worked steadfastly in his contribution to making the department what it is today.

LT Mike Cimino joined the department in 1997, having come to Hodgkins from Justice PD. He served in the US Army as an MP for several years before transitioning to civilian law enforcement. Over the years he

served in various capacities on the department, most notably as the DARE Officer and as a Juvenile Officer. LT Cimino also serves on the Pension Board.

LT Ryan Carrasquillo came to the Hodgkins Police Department in 2007. He served in the US Marine Corps. LT Carrasquillo served a tour of duty in Iraq, as well as tours in California and South America. At the Hodgkins Police Department he has served in a number of roles, including as a Motorcycle Officer, a Master Firearms Instructor, a Rifle Instructor, and as a department fundraising coordinator for the Special Olympics.

In addition to the most recent changes in roles, OFC Phil Kringlie was recently promoted to Patrol Sergeant, at the July Village Board meeting. SGT Kringlie has served in Patrol, on the 5th District SWAT team, as a Master Firearms Instructor, and as a Rifle Instructor.
