



## A Message from Mayor Noel B. Cummings . . .

MWRD has taken years of investment and innovation to improve the quality of the water to the level it is today. The improvement in the water quality is evident in human activity and aquatic life. Both are benefiting from a healthier environment. In the 1970s the MWRD first began monitoring the fish population, which has drastically increased. In 1974 there was 10 known

species, by 2019 that number has increased to 77.



Bluegills now more abundant in our river.



Over the decades the abundance and diversity of fish species has also increased. We have seen an increased number of game fish species like the largemouth and smallmouth bass, sunfish, bluegills, black crappie, rock bass as well as channel catfish. In the 1970's the fish population was scarce and absent in some locations but have become more abundant as the water quality improved.

Much of that TARP activity, which is the reason for water quality improvements, is located in Hodgkins' back yard. The Mainstream Pumping Station, on River Road in Hodgkins, is responsible for pumping the tunnels and reservoirs to the water reclamation plants for treatment. It is considered one of the world's largest pumping stations and has

the capacity to pump more than 1 billion gallons of sewage per day from a depth of over 350 feet. The pump room at the bottom of the station is the lowest structure in Cook County.

We would like to thank the MWRD for a clean and safe place to fish.

## Do you recycle? If not, why not? By Denise Struve

Some reasons people give for why they don't recycle are that it's inconvenient, or they don't have enough space in their home to recycle. While some states (Michigan, for example) charge a deposit on glass and plastic bottles and aluminum cans, Illinois does not, so there's no financial penalty for people if they don't recycle. Some people don't believe that recycling really makes a difference. But there's something I ask you to consider:

Do you have any idea how plastics are polluting our oceans, rivers and Great Lakes? The pictures below show plastics washed up on the shores of the ocean (first picture) and one of the Great Lakes (second picture).

Some of the plastics become broken down over time, into small particles called "microplastics." Plastic pollution travels differently in the Great Lakes compared to the oceans. In the world's oceans, trash and debris can wash up from really far-away places due to global ocean currents. In the Great Lakes, plastic pollution doesn't come from an anonymous source far away; it flows out from our shorelines because we leave it there. Across the Great Lakes region, plastic travels through local watersheds and from beaches into the lakes before flowing with currents downstream. Eventually, tiny pieces of that litter flow out to the ocean, and our Great Lakes plastic pollution adds to the global ocean plastic problem.

The bottom line is that we have a responsibility to be accountable for the ways in which our habits affect our environment.

#### 5 Reasons Why People Should Recycle

#### 1. Recycling saves energy.

...because the manufacturer doesn't have to produce something new from raw natural resources. Using recycled materials saves on energy consumption, which keeps production costs down.

#### 2. Recycling reduces landfills.

Recycling reduces the need to use more land for landfills. No one wants to live next to a landfill!

#### 3. Recycling preserves our resources and protects wildlife.

By recycling, we reduce the destruction of habitats for animals. Paper recycling alone saves millions of trees.

#### 4. Recycling is good for the economy.

Recycling and purchasing recycled products creates a greater demand for more recycled goods. Goods made from recycled materials use less water, create less pollution and use less energy.

#### 5. Recycling helps our climate problems.

Recycling produces considerably less carbon, which reduces the amount of unhealthy greenhouse gas emissions.

If you still feel recycling isn't possible for you, there are some other things you can do:

Consider reducing your single-use plastic consumption. Carry a glass or metal drinking bottle (or even a clean jar) for drinks. If you get coffee from a coffee shop, invest in a re-usable mug that you bring with you (many coffee shops have these available for purchase). Make sure to bring reusable bags to the grocery store. Save your glass jars and use them to store leftovers. Skip the straw. You just have to commit and develop a routine to break bad habits of convenience.

**Be a proactive consumer.** Look at the packaging of the products you use, and try to buy products that are packaged in reusable or recyclable containers. If you eat out frequently, consider bringing your own container for leftovers. There is a growing desire among some consumers to be more sustainable and reduce their environmental impact. Some of these preferences have led to a 400% increase in farmers' markets in the U.S. since 1994, helping to connect consumers more closely with the source of the products.

While Reduce, Reuse, Recycle are habits we should all take more seriously, I hope you will consider making them a personal priority.

## **Village Tax Rebates**

The Residential Tax Rebates are paid to those residents who received property tax bills from Cook County. Proof of payment is required. This is obtained by a receipt from your bank or lender. The Village will reimburse you the Village of Hodgkins portion listed on your tax bill. If you have not filed for your Property Tax Rebate yet, please contact the Village hall for information.

Mobile Home residents and those residents that rent or lease an apartment are eligible for a garbage rebate as long as you have resided in Hodgkins as of

## Claude Sexton: A Hodgkins Resident You Should Know By Rodney Cummings



In any inventory of essential community personalities, of people you absolutely must know, there's one man who certainly cannot be omitted. A well-known face at any Hodgkins event, Claude Sexton is perhaps best remembered as the long-time Village Clerk, although before that he served both as a Trustee and on the Planning Commission.

He recently retired from public service (in 2015) after having served a combined total of twenty-eight years on the village board.

Claude was born in 1945, at home, on Bennett's Ridge in Edmonton, Kentucky, to Dewey and Jeanette (née Harper), the oldest of four children. Claude and his mother were brought by a family friend to northeast Illinois, to join his father who'd returned

immediately for work, two weeks after his birth. They lived initially in the Clearing neighborhood of Chicago, until he was five years old, when his family moved to Summit, where they lived at three different houses on the same street through the years. Claude's siblings were born during those early years in Illinois: Donna, Brenda, and Ricky. During this time, his father worked as a certified welder and pipe fitter. A little

Claude says his first "real" job was at Corn Products in Argo. He worked in the analytical laboratory, starting in 1964, for about a year and a half. From there, he went to work at Alberto Culver (VO5), working in their research laboratory on shampoos and hair dyes for about two years. He was then encouraged to put in an application with Universal Oil Products (UOP, later purchased by Honeywell) in McCook. He was hired, and worked there for thirty-three years in the analytical labs on quality control and method development, retiring in November 2000.

"People will tell you that the laziest people will find the easiest way to get things done. That was me," Claude added, laughing. "I was able to literally cut the analytical time to less than half. That doesn't mean anything if it only takes you a minute, and you cut it to thirty seconds. But it means a lot when it takes you eight hours and you cut it to four."

Claude met his future wife, Betty Evans, at church (Welcome Hill Baptist Church, which initially had meetings in a large former chicken house). They married in 1965, when he was twenty. Betty and her family had moved into Hodgkins from Cleveland, Tennessee in 1949. Claude and Betty had three children, spread in birth from the late 1960s to the early 1980s: Eileen (Tucker), Jeffrey, and Stephanie (da Silva). All of their children grew up in Hodgkins.

later, in 1959, they moved to Justice. Claude attended Argo High School, where he graduated in 1963.

Claude made his first (unsuccessful) run for Village of Hodgkins Trustee in 1983. He ran again in 1987, and won. After serving for three of the four years of that term, Claude was invited to fill the vacancy in the Village Clerk position when Dolores Hardesty retired in 1990, and he accepted the appointment. He continued running for and serving in that position for the remainder of his years on the village board.

Claude said an important event happened after he first lost election to the position of Trustee in 1983, when Mayor Cummings invited him to lunch the next day. At lunch, they discussed the mayor's plan to try to get a shopping center in Hodgkins, where the Quarry Shopping Center is now located, and he asked Claude to serve on the Planning Commission, and Claude accepted. He found his role in helping to bring that project into fruition very gratifying. But he also made it clear that his work serving on the board was not always as easy as it appeared.

"We were unified as a board. We weren't one-upping each other. It looked fairly pallid at the board meetings, that it was just a rubber-stamping, but it wasn't. We had our finger pointing and fist pounding done in committee. What the people saw at the board meeting was the result of the committee meetings. That had already taken place. Of course the voting public had every opportunity to see that side of it, too, but not a lot of people would come to committee meetings."

In 2006, Claude began having skin issues on his nose that turned out to be malignant. He went to see Dr. Sami Bittar in LaGrange, and it was soon determined he would have to have the lower portion of his nose removed. When it came time to have the reconstructive surgery, he got an important referral from his doctor.

"When I went in to see Dr. Bittar, he said, and this is no joke, 'I am good. I am very, very good. But you need to see Dr. Burget.' And I said, 'What's a Dr. Burget?' He said, 'Dr. Burget is the best plastic surgeon in the country, maybe even the world. He's right here in Chicago; you don't have to go to San Francisco or New York. He's right here, on Lake Shore Drive.' So I did." Claude went on the have the surgery, and it was an overwhelming success.

Claude currently serves on the Pleasantview Fire Protection District's Board of Fire Commissioners (thirty years next October). "That just kind of keeps my finger in the realm of activity," he said. "I can't slow down, because I don't want to turn to jelly. And if you do, you will." So now Claude has no immediate plans of retiring completely from public service.






